

CBA grad tops TSU graduating class of 2024



The valedictorian of the graduating batch for the academic year 2023-2024 received his diploma and medal onstage without any parent or guardian.

Ivan F. Dizon, a magna cum laude graduate of Bachelor of Science in Business Administration major in Marketing Management, came from a broken family. He no longer lives with his mother and has never met his father, a German national.

"Magugulat po siguro kayo kung sasabihin ko na ako lang po ang pumunta dito at nagsabit sa aking medalya. Hindi po alam ng aking pamilya na meron na silang first-ever degree holder at may Latin honor pa," Dizon said in his speech.

Dizon was a scholar of the Philippine Army Finance Center Producers Integrated Cooperative. He was also a working student who tried to make ends meet as a fast-food restaurant crew and sometimes in sales.

At a young age, he was forced to work to afford shelter

and his basic needs and to be able to enroll himself in this university.

"I was belittled and judged because of my financial misfortune. But you know what? What's even worse (is), since I was a child, I did not have the conventional support and privileges that many of us

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enjoyed," he said.

"My mother is a single parent at hindi ko po siya kasama dahil nasa ibang bahay (siya). But she was the one who took care of me when I was a child. Iba po ang aking tatay dahil half German po ako, pero hindi po ako kinilala ng aking ama. Ni

minsan wala po akong natanggap ni

sentimo mula sa kanya," he added.

According to Dizon, some thought he was living a "prosperous life" because he never used the term "working student" as an excuse. He did not want to romanticize poverty.

"Lahat ng trabaho at sales pinasok ko 'yan. Lahat ng hirap at sakit at pangungutya ng ibang tao, naranasan ko 'yan mag-isa. Lahat ng sigaw at pamamahiya ng mga customers, tiniis ko 'yan. Nag-aaral ako sa umaga,

nagtatrabaho ako sa gabi. Kung hindi sana laging napupuyat para lang maka-survive, walang salita ang makakapaglarawan kung gaano kahirap at kasakit ang lumaban para sa mga pangarap," Dizon further said.

As the top student in his batch, Dizon also received the Sen. Manny Villar Award for academic excellence. He marched

alongside 2,171 graduate and undergraduate students at the TSU Gymnasium from July 16-19, 2024.

Commission on Higher Education Regional Office III Director, challenged the graduates, whom she called "Iskolar ng Bayan," since they benefited from the Free Tuition Law. She left them with three important things: magpasalamat, mag-ambag, maglingkod.

"Mayroon akong tatlong hamon sa inyo, only for the finest students at Tarlac State University. Una magpasalamat, pangalawa mag-ambag, pangatlo maglingkod. Why? Simply because you are the 'Iskolars ng

Bayan,' you have to be grateful, you have to contribute, you have to serve. We will not be asking anything from you. CHED will not be asking anything from you other than magpasalamat, magambag, maglingkod," Dr. Yusi said.

Dr. Yusi shared national artist Ricky Lee's view of a diploma, an excerpt from his 2019 speech at the Polytechnic University of the Philippines when he was conferred with an honoris causa, "Yang hawak mong diploma, para 'yan sa iba. Hindi 'yan para sa'yo," which was published in Lee's book "Ang Kulang na Silya."



TSU reps witness Moncada's 150th founding anniversary logo reveal

Representatives from Tarlac State University participated in the unveiling of Moncada town's 150th founding anniversary logo on July 1, 2024 at the Luis Morales Auditorium.

Dr. Lino L. Dizon, former NHCP commissioner and former TSU Center for Tarlaqueño Studies director, and Asst. Prof. Bryan Jan S. Dizon, extension project leader for "Moncada@150," joined Mayor Estelita M. Aquino, Councilor George Michael Aguilar, Ms. Juvy Mendoza, tourism officer, and Mr. Christopher John Pabo, Moncada history book project lead, in the unveiling.

The event is part of the town's Araw ng Pasasalamat for its 149th founding anniversary. It marks the last day of the celebration and the beginning of the countdown for the 150th anniversary.

"Love is our theme for our 149th founding anniversary.



And we cannot fully express love to our constituencies without the necessary machinery and resources that fully align with our development agenda," Mayor Aquino said during her State of Municipal Address.

The town will celebrate its 150th anniversary on July 1, 2025, wherein the university's Center for Community and Local Governance Studies and Policy Development will help in preparing for the celebration

through the extension project "Preserving Moncada's Legacy: A Path to 150 Years (Moncada@150)."

TSU and the local government of Moncada signed a memorandum of agreement for this long-term extension project last May 31, 2024, focusing on publishing a book spanning 1874-2024 about heritage, history, and traditions.

The partnership will revolve around six components: archival research, cultural mapping, community workshops and awareness, Moncada cultural identity and branding, educational initiatives, and archive digitization, according to Prof. Dizon during the MOA signing.

Aside from Dr. Dizon and Prof. Dizon, College of Education faculty members Dr. Ninez B. Tulo and Mr. Christian G. Lingad, CCLGSPD's Mr. John H. Lanuzo and Ms. Kate T. Tagara, and the Office of Public Affairs, who are part of the extension project, attended the activity.

TSU, TRADOC PH Army to continue working for comm skills enhancement

Tarlac State University sealed **L** a five-year partnership for skills training and capability enhancement of the Training and Doctrine Command Philippine Army through a memorandum of agreement signed on July 30, 2024 at the Main AVR.

Titled "Forward, March! Communication Skills Training and Development for Philippine Army," this project of the College of Arts and Social Sciences aims to advance and develop communication skills and research and teaching methodologies in the army context.

As a long-term extension project, some CASS faculty members will serve as lecturers and consultants in

the annual training cycles of army trainees and officers from different TRADOC training centers and extension schools nationwide.

"With the so many extension services that we are rendering to our different clientele, naisip po namin na we will be having this long-term extension project to have an impact and be able to help our uniformed personnel," TSU President Dr. Arnold E. Velasco said.

Moreover, Pres. Velasco also committed his "all-out support" to give the "very best" services to TRADOC.

Meanwhile, Col. Jeffrey Jake D. Gallenero MNSA (Inf) PA, Army Leadership and Education Center Director, TRADOC PA, thanked TSU for its dedication and willingness to share their expertise with the

army.

"This is not merely a training initiative; it is a transformative endeavor aimed at equipping our personnel with essential skills that will serve them both on and off the battlefield," Col. Gallenero said.

"This partnership will empower our officers and soldiers to become leaders, communicators, and educators, thus contributing to a more competent and resilient Philippine Army," he added.

According to Dr. Gladie Natherine G. Cabanizas, project leader and Student Development Services Assistant Director, the partnership between the two parties has been ongoing since 2016. The signing will further strengthen the relationship between TSU and TRADOC.

Eighty-eight STEM graduates of the Laboratory School received their diplomas last July 12, 2024 at the TSU Gymnasium, with the Laboratory School's Supreme Student Government president as the batch valedictorian.

SSG President Kerol Arkie Tarriela, one of the recipients of "with high honors," led the graduation ceremony with a valedictory speech recounting how their batch overcame academic and personal struggles.

"Lab School is not merely a place of learning; it is a crucible of challenges and opportunities. Each day, we entered its halls knowing that we would encounter obstacles that tested our resolve. It often felt like navigating a battlefield, where perseverance and resilience were our greatest allies," Tariella said in his speech.

Tariella also shared how he grieved over the two family members he deeply loves — his father and grandmother. He dedicates his achievements and awards to Lola Fe, his "confidant and greatest supporter, who joined the Creator this year.

Moreover, he said his pain was "compounded by academic breakdowns." Grief became his silent companion

that shaped him in "profound" ways. He treated it as his source of strength and not as a source of pain throughout his academic journey.

"The future is not something we enter. The future is something we create. With fate as our guide and faith as our compass, let us go forth and create a future that is bright, meaningful, and full of promise," he added.

Tariella also lauded the "unsung heroes" of TSU whose hard work made his school days "smoother and more pleasant."

"And let's not forget the unsung heroes—the administrative staff, the janitors, the cafeteria workers. You kept the wheels turning, the hallways clean, and the food scrumptious," Tariella said.

Meanwhile, Col. Rey I. Daet, former deputy director of the Armed Forces of the Philippines Leadership Development Center, also an LS alumnus from batch 1997, was the invited commencement speaker for the ceremonies.

The LS alumnus reminded the graduates to "never fear change, embrace every

> opportunity, and face every challenge with bravery and profound faith."

Col. Daet said LS graduates will write the new chapters of Philippine history.

He also urged the graduating class to become an "instrument of change" by using their knowledge to contribute to and help society, help those in need, improve the community, and maintain the dignity and integrity of each Filipino.

"Harapin ninyo ang kinabukasan nang may tapang, talino, at puso. Magsilbi kayong liwanag at pag-asa para sa isang makabagong Pilipinas," Col. Daet said.

Meanwhile, Department of Budget and Management Secretary Amenah Pangandaman assured the university that the government will prioritize the budget for education during her commencement speech.

De Ocampo is a student leader, a farmer, and a working student who faced bullying and self-doubt. He juggled his time with his studies while being a farmer, an on-call crew at a catering service, and a barista.

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SOL batch 2024 top grad to Class Marangyan: 'Let us never lose sight of the reason that brought us here'

The Tarlac State University L School of Law's Class Marangyan was conferred with the Juris Doctor degree last July 11, 2024 at the TSU Hotel, Lucinda Campus.

Legal Education Board Chairperson Atty. Jason Barlis, the commencement speaker, addressed the Class Marangyan (Marangal na Manananggol ng Bayan), composed of 20 JD graduates.

"Learn to make sacrifices. During this time, you must devote your undivided time and effort to pass this last remaining examination before you become a full-fledged lawyer. It is going to be difficult for sure, but bear in mind that you have already taken exams and quizzes beforehand. You are prepared for this," he said in his speech.

Atty. Barlis shared his struggles during the Bar examination in September 2001, the same time his eldest child was born as he was taking the exam. He said the Bar examination is a "test of oneself." There will be times when

the takers will experience a breakdown and ask if they should continue with the journey. "But remember this: no one goes to the Bar fully prepared," Atty. Barlis said. "Excellence is nothing

without ethics. By now, you are already aware that our profession is imbued with [the] public interest, not because we are the government's favorite profession but because of the nature of our work. If you try to compare the principles you studied in legal ethics with the reality of practices in the legal profession, you will realize that theory is somehow far from the reality," Atty. Barlis further said.

In preparation for the upcoming Bar exam, some graduates received grants and scholarships for review from benefactors.

One of the recipients is Ms. Ashly Denise Calaguas, Class Marangyan valedictorian, who obtained an 89.76 general weighted average. She was also awarded Best in Moot Court and Best in Litigation.

As a scholar of the Justice Jose C. Dela Rama Sr. Law Foundation, Inc., she received the Justice Jose C. Dela Rama Sr. Award and will be given a financial grant for the Bar review center

of her choice.

In her valedictory speech, she shared how prayers and even making mistakes were instrumental in their journey in law school.

"The silent prayers we uttered during recitations had been our constant companions when we [did] not know the answers presented by our professors. Some of these prayers were answered, but most were not. Sometimes, even when we try our best, it is still not enough, but that is okay because law school is the place to make mistakes and to learn from these mistakes. We have often questioned ourselves whether we should continue the struggles," Ms. Calaguas said.

The Class Marangyan top graduate also shared the lyrics of the song 'Karera' by the Philippine girl group BINI, which says "Sino bang nagsabi na kailangan kong mauna? Hindi naman ito karera, pwedeng magdahan-dahan. Sa bawat panibagong umaga, Ang pagsimula muli ay isang tagumpay na."

"Let's carry forward this intellectual precocity and courage to stand for what is right. Class of Marangyan, our journey towards our dreams will be filled with challenges and trials, setbacks and successes, that through it all, let us never lose

LGU Gerona collaborates with TSU CCS for ICT devt

The local government of Gerona benchmarked six offices of Tarlac State University to improve their ICT services on July 9, 2024 at the BAC AVR, Main Campus.

Among the offices they visited are the Office of Management and Information System, Office of Human Resource Development and Management, Budget Management Unit, Accounting Unit, Supply and Property Management Unit, and Procurement Unit to learn about the university's systems and process of transactions to serve the residents of Gerona better.

Moreover, they inquired about how the OMIS resolves problems and system failures. On the other hand,

the SPMU shared its technique in assigning QR codes to the university's properties and items for easy tracing and accessing of details.

The LGU's visit is part of the long-term extension program of the College of Computer Studies titled "Advancing Technology, Advancing Government (ATAG): LGU Gerona and CCS Partner for ICT Governance and Development."

Dr. Marlon Gamido, OMIS director and ATAG overall project leader, turned over a data cabinet to the LGU Gerona delegates, which they can use initially for networking and computing equipment.

The ATAG started on April 28, 2023, aimed to improve the municipality's service delivery to its constituents through digitization and ICT, permit and license

applications and tax payment, among others. This will result in faster and more advanced transactions and less delays and errors through process streamlining.

Some CCS faculty members will also help mentor municipal employees on the use of technology and its system and monitoring.

Alongside Dr. Gamido, the ATAG is being materialized through the efforts of Dr. Heidilyn Gamido, component head for information systems; Dr. Edjie Delos Reyes, component head for network and hardware; Prof. Valarie Simbol, component head for training and education; Prof. Dennis Virtudazo, component head for process improvement; and Prof. Jerome

The Career Education and Job Placement Services (CEJPS) conducts career fairs annually to prepare TSU graduates through onsite job interviews with invited companies' HR personnel, thus opening a wide range of job opportunities after graduation.

Some of the companies present are CS Global, Emerge Local, Central Luzon Doctors' Hospital, SM Supermalls, Megasaver, Army Recruitment, Tarlac Medical Center, LamAsia Corporation, Hann, and Yokohama, among others.

CEJPS also tapped government agencies that graduates can inquire from like the PAGIBIG, Social Security System, NBI, and PhilHealth.



EDITORIAL



C ince former president SRodrigo Duterte signed RA 10931 into law in 2017, undergraduate students from public higher education institutions have been attending classes without paying any tuition and even miscellaneous fees in the long run. This "Free Tuition Law" was a blessing to Filipino families hoping to have their very first college graduates. However, as years pass by, reality sinks in that the country's free higher education only has limited slots not only for Tarlac State University but also for other state universities and colleges.

The free higher education law implementation gave more tertiary students a higher chance to pursue a college degree, which is a big step toward fulfilling SDG 4 or Quality Education. In a May 2024, Sen. Win Gatchalian said

enrollees in SUCs and LUCs increased from 1.6 million to 1.8 million based on the data from academic years 2018-2019 to 2022-2023. Indeed, significant achievements and milestones have been brought about by the noble law. More and more students are becoming closer to having a better future.

Yet, the "birth pains" of implementing this law ushered the university's administration in 2019 toward an uproar of college applicants who were not qualified to enroll because their results did not meet the needed admission exam quota. Moreover, free tuition slots were deemed limited based on absorptive capacity, leading to rigid figures for admissions. Since then, applicants, parents, and other interested stakeholders have been eagle-eyed in taking notes regarding the number of applicants admitted by TSU



every academic year. Figures have been increasing, but the absorptive capacity, which refers to the available classrooms, laboratories, and faculty, remains the same. As much as the university would want to accommodate more students under the free tuition law, the target and actual data could not be bent. It seems like TSU crushed the would-be college students' dreams.

The university's absorptive capacity dictates the budget allocation to implement the law. The billions of budget from the national government are to be split by the 112 SUCs and 78 LUCs, which is not enough to cover all Filipino youth who are about to enter and continue their tertiary studies. Yet, on a positive note, there is a solution to the limited admissions. TSU ventured into

one provision of RA 10931 this year, the opt-out mechanism. More undergraduate students could now enter TSU but would have to pay their tuition and other fees until they complete their degrees - a positivenegative, as others would say. Filipino students flocked to SUCs and LUCs because of the free tuition, but now, they must pay to study.

The opt-out mechanism balances the need to respond to the students' clamor to be accepted to an SUC or LUC. Surprisingly, there were only a few adverse reactions when TSU released its initial guidelines for such a mechanism. It shows that quality and affordable education outranks the dream of studying for free. Studying has always been their goal, after all. The free tuition was just a bonus. What was thought of as negative turned out to be positive.
